Spelling Bee, Knowledge Bowl and Reflections Awards! (More information to come!) The Votes are in!! (Not that other election in November!)

At our November PTA meeting we discussed and voted on the allocation of the additional funds earned at the Fall Festival. We had \$9,000 up for grabs. There were many ideas presented and an informative discussion on how we could make the greatest impact on the education of our students at Foothill. The final decision was to allocate \$7,800 to the purchase and installation of permanent, mounted sound systems in the classrooms. Each system is approx \$1,100, so we currently can equip 7 classrooms with these much needed systems. We will concentrate on the larger, upper grades with the most need. This will also allow younger students progressing through Foothill to benefit from this purchase.

Information on sound systems from Mrs. Walker (current 5th grade teacher at Foothill):

"I highly recommend having a permanent voice enhancement system in each classroom. Research has shown that it will help students with any type of hearing loss, students working with English Language Development (formally English as a Second Language), students with attentive disorders such as ADHD or ADD, young children learning phonics and phonemic recognition, and students with perfectly normal hearing. Basically it will benefit ALL students! Studies have shown that students who do not have a hearing problem are still missing out on a 1/3 of the information being presented, simply because of poor acoustics in a classroom setting. The results are increased test scores in ALL areas: math, science, reading, writing, art, social studies, and music."

"From personal experiences with using a permanent audio enhancement system, it was simple and easy to use. I wore a light-weight microphone around my neck. It came off and on the lanyard easily thus making it possible for students to share their reading, writing, or other thoughts. It was empowering to the students to hear their voice amplified. Students were on-task more, because they could hear more of what was going on. It makes a major difference in student attention. My students loved it, and did not like it when I did not wear one. It made a huge difference at my last school, and that same difference can be made at Foothill Elementary."

The additional \$1,200 available will be set aside for a teacher grant. A teacher or a group of teachers can write a grant to Foothill PTA to provide specific needs in their classrooms. A PTA committee will then determine who will receive the money based on the greatest needs. This is new to Foothill, but is done on a regular basis at the secondary schools. We thought we would give it a try.

Side note: There were two other items of high interest during our meeting. The teachers are in need of a new laminator (about \$1,800) and also desire to add a 2nd set of ukuleles (\$640) for Explorer Time.

Two items of success that will potentially help us get both items:

- 1. Target Gives Back: Many parents and family members participated in a Facebook campaign (thanks Suzy Baller for giving us the heads up!) during this past summer. We were able to earn \$450! Thank you for voting and thank you Target!!
- 2. Box Tops: We projected that Box Tops would bring in \$2,200 for the year. As of the end of October, we already hit the \$2,100 mark!! (Thank you Tacy Wells!) Keep clipping and sending in the Box Tops...what an easy way to earn CASH for our school.

gymnastics & karate, and sampling edamame, pomegranates, and different cheeses. Lets help our kids find that exercise and eating healthy can be fun!


Pick-Up in the North Parking Lot Circle:

NURSING NEWS

WINTER SAFETY TIPS

Whether winter brings severe storms, light dustings, or just cold temperatures, the American Academy of Pediatrics has some valuable tips on how to keep your children safe and warm.

WHAT TO WEAR:

The rule of thumb for older babies and young children is to dress them in one more layer of clothing than an adult would wear in the same conditions.

HYPOTHERMIA:

- -Hypothermia develops when a child's temperature falls below normal due to exposure to cold. It often happens when a child is playing outdoors in extremely cold weather without proper clothing.
- -As hypothermia sets in, the child may shiver and become lethargic and clumsy. His/her speech may become slurred and his/her body temperature will decline.
- -If you suspect your child is hypothermic, call 911 at once. Until help arrives, take the child indoors, remove any wet clothing, and wrap him/her in blankets or warm clothes.

FROSTBITE:

- -Frostbite happens when the skin and outer tissues become frozen. This condition tends to happen on extremities like the fingers, toes, ears, and nose. They may become pale, gray, and blistered. At the same time, the child may complain that his/her skin burns or has become numb.
- -If frostbite occurs, bring the child indoors and place the frost-bitten parts of his/her body in warm (not hot) water. 104 degrees farenheit is recommended. Warm washcloths may be applied to frostbitten nose, ears, and lips. Do not rub the frozen areas.
- -After a few minutes, dry and cover him/her with clothing or blankets. Give him/her something warm to drink.
- -If the numbness continues for more than a few minutes, call your doctor.

WINTER HEALTH:

- -If your child suffers from winter nosebleeds, try using a cold air humidifier in the child's room at night. Saline nose drops may help keep tissues moist.
- -Cold weather does not cause colds or flu. But the viruses that cause colds and flu tend to be more common in the winter, when children are in school and are in closer contact with each other. Frequent hand washing and teaching your child to sneeze or cough into the bend of his/her elbow may help reduce the spread of colds and the flu.
- -Children between the ages of 6 months-59 months should get the influenza vaccine to reduce the risk of catching the flu.

Here's to a healthy winter!
