#### NURSING NEWS

Dear Parents,

The Utah Clean Cities Coalition and its stakeholders has identified unnecessary vehicles idling as a contributor to air pollution and increased health risk in our state. One of the areas where unnecessary idling occurs the most is at schools by parents waiting to drop off and pick up their children.

Just one vehicle dropping off and picking up one child at one school puts about three pounds of pollution into the air per month. In addition, idling consumes ½ gallon to one gallon of fuel per hour and uses more fuel than turning off and on your engine.

The common effects of air pollution on most people are those you can feel, like irritation of the eyes, nose, throat, and lungs. These effects may be more severe and serious if you have certain health conditions such as a cold or have asthma, emphysema or allergies. Effects of air pollution are also more serious if you have a heart or circulatory disease.

Please help improve our air quality and reducing health risks by:

Eliminating idling in school zones, at ATM machines, at drive-thru lanes, and while running in to a dry cleaner or other place of business for a "quick stop."

This simple but critical change in behavior of idling your vehicle no longer than 30 seconds will drastically improve the air quality in your neighborhoods and the air your children breathe!
