We are proud to be a STEAM school. STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics. Being a STEAM school means we purposefully integrate subjects to create engaging, meaningful learning for students. These learning experiences apply to the real world and encourage students to work with each other to think critically and to develop problem-solving strategies. This type of learning prepares students well for college and for future careers.

The Engineering Design Cycle is the core of STEAM instruction (see picture below). Students think like engineers to solve a real-world problem(s). They naturally ask questions and imagine ways they can solve the problem(s) effectively. Together with others they make/draw a plan and then create it. After they see how well (or not well) it works they find ways to improve upon their creation. When students' creations fail or don't work as well as they had originally thought, students naturally repeat the Engineering Design Cycle to continually improve their work.

An important part of STEAM is that it is for every student in every classroom. It is not a special program, a club, or just for a certain group or class. STEAM is for everyone! This type of learning will give students confidence to face problems that will come their way and have the needed skills to effectively, creatively solve them. I once heard that many of the jobs our students will have in ten years have not even been thought of, created, or invented yet. Gone are the days where we can merely train students with a specific skill set. We need our students to think creatively, to problem solve effectively, and to work well with others.

We are excited for the incredible opportunity we have to focus on the Technology part of STEAM. Technology will not distract us from what we are doing as a STEAM school, rather it will strengthen and accelerate student learning and help them become creative problem solvers as they connect with the world and each other through authentic learning experiences.

I am confident that as we implement STEAM learning more and more into our classrooms and learning that students at Foothill Elementary will gain these essential skills for not only school and work, but for life!

TECHNOLOGY MATCHING GRANT!

Have you heard?!

A very generous donor has pledged \$150,000 for technology at Foothill if we can match that amount in the next 30 days (by October 15th, 2015). This may sound daunting, but we have already raised more than \$60,000! We, as a school and community of families and businesses, need to unite our efforts to take full advantage of this incredible opportunity!

What can you do?

I hope every family of Foothill will donate, no matter the amount. Every bit will make a difference. What an exciting opportunity for all of us to unite together for a great cause that will directly benefit our students and help them learn. You can also spread the word to extended family members, employers, businesses and neighbors as we continue to ask for help in raising the money for this effort.

Why technology?

At Foothill we are committed to help every student learn. We are proud to be a STEAM school where students are taught to think creatively to solve real-world problems. The limited funding we are allocated each year is directed to those endeavors that will best increase student learning.

Foothill has been encouraged by the district to use Trust Land funds and any other sources to increase technology in classrooms. The district has provided the infrastructure for technology in our school but does not have the funds to procure the hardware.

As you know, smaller class sizes can increase the likelihood that students will learn and as the principal I am committed to do all I can to keep class sizes as small as possible. This year, a significant portion of our Trust Land money was allocated to reducing class sizes rather than going toward technology.

As we look toward integrating technology in our school to accelerate student learning this grant would make our technology dreams a reality. What an amazing opportunity! It is my belief that through generous donations from local businesses and from as many Foothill families as possible we will be able to secure this grant.

NURSING NEWS

Do your kids come home from school and make a beeline to the kitchen looking for something to eat? If so, how can you make sure they enjoy a snack while still saving room for a healthy dinner?

Kids need less frequent snacks as they get older, but it's not surprising that most are hungry after school. Many kids eat lunch early-11:30 am or even before- and then have an afternoon of classes and maybe even an after-school activity before their next chance to eat.

These steps can guide kids to healthy after-school snacks that will be satisfying and still leave room for a nutritious dinner.

FIGURE OUT THE TIMING

Find out: When is lunchtime for your kids. What and how much do they eat at lunch? Do they ever skip lunch? This will help you figure out how hungry your kids will be when they get home.

You'll also want to think about what time you normally serve dinner. A child who gets home famished at 3:15 pm and eats a large snack probably won't be hungry if dinner is at 5:30 pm. Likewise, it may not be reasonable to expect a child whose parents work late to go until 7:30 pm with nothing to eat since lunch. Think about your kids' schedules and plan accordingly.

CREATE A LIST OF HEALTHY OPTIONS

Talk about which snacks your kids would like to have at snack time. Come up with a list of healthy options together and be sure to include a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables. Take your kids along to the grocery store. Being involved in the process makes it more likely that kids will learn to make healthy food choices.

MAKE HEALTHY SNACKS AN EASY CHOICE

Make healthy snacks easily available by packing them in your kids lunchboxes or backpacks or by having them visible and ready-to-eat at home. Easy to pack snack options include trail mix, nuts, low-sugar whole grain cereal, whole-grain pretzels or crackers, fresh or dried fruit, and cut-up vegetables. Older kids often like making their own snacks, so provide the ingredients and a few simple instructions. If dinner is just around the corner, consider allowing a "first course," such as a small salad or side vegetable while you finish preparing the family meal.

For those nights when dinner is hours away, offer a more substantial snack such as half a sandwich or a quesadilla topped with salsa. A good snack should take more time to eat than it does to prepare!

If your child comes home to an empty house, the best strategy is to leave something healthy front and center on the kitchen counter or in the refrigerator. A hungry child, like a hungry adult, is likely to take the path of least resistance!

\$150K Technology Matching Grant

Timeline showing the series of events that led to the Foothill \$150K Technology Challenge

- **2013-2014** Utah State testing required to be taken on computers.
- **October 2014** PTA expresses concern over lack of technology time and student access to computers at Foothill.
- January 2015 Dr. B proposes 5-year plan for Technology in classrooms.
- **September 2015** PTA begins to fundraise for technology needs.
- **September 15, 2015** Generous Donor Match offered to Foothill. \$150K matching grant.
- **September 18, 2015** Foothill families begin making a difference through donating to their own children's education.
- **September 24, 2015** Alpine School district technology team commits to helping make technology a success at Foothill.
- September 25, 2015 \$60K total donations from families at Foothill.
- **October 2015** Fundraising continues. Foothill families reach out to employers, businesses and neighbors.

Future (We HOPE!)

- **October 15, 2015** Foothill community of families, neighbors and businesses donate a total of \$150K.
- October 15, 2015 Donor Match is given to Foothill.
- November 2015 Teachers prepare for technology in their classrooms.
- January May 2016 Students begin using technology in their classroom learning.
- **Spring 2016** Students better prepared for State computer testing.
- August 2016 Every classroom has technology. Learning is enhanced, engaging and accelerated. Teachers have access to greater tools in teaching.
- **2016 and on** teacher training and support is ongoing.

Technology in our schools is not the future...it is the NOW! Schools throughout the nation and even locally are integrating computer technology into the learning environment and seeing amazing results. Technology allows teachers to do more at a faster rate.

Studies show that children who are immersed in coding and hands-on technology have increased skills in logical thinking, problem solving, persistence, collaboration, self-expression and communication.

Computers in the classroom provide intervention and enrichment for all levels of students!! The possibilities include: researching, keyboarding, coding, interactive learning, publishing, collaborating among peers, and so much more!

Foothill is ready to plug the technology in the classroom. Alpine School District is providing the networking with multi-million dollar projects. The major missing link is our funding...until now! With a total of \$300K the funding will not only provide the computers and technology for every classroom, but will cover the costs of professional development, support and training associated in integrating this technology successfully.

Utah ranks 51st in the nation in student spending for education. That is roughly \$6600 per student compared to other states of up to \$19,000 per student. Will education in Utah ever change? It's been this way for decades. The reality is we will never get the money from the State or District to supply our children with the tools they need in technology. We may not change state public policy, but we can stand up and change what is happening at our school. In addition, Foothill doesn't have the demographics to qualify for the big \$300K - \$400K government technology grants. This is our chance!

You may have already heard the buzz going around the school with regards to this grant. In just 3 days \$20,000 has been raised toward the \$150K goal through private family donations.

Talks with local businesses have begun trying to find creative ways to secure the hardware and to do so with ongoing relationships!! The hope is to continue to reach out to families and organizations locally (including local University resources) to help raise the needed money for the match. We need every family to help. Today someone mentioned their employer had a matching program. This parent is going to start asking the important questions and share our message. **If you do not have the means, we suggest using your voice!** Reach out to family members, friends, employers, neighbors and businesses in our area. 600 families working towards this goal will make all the difference. Together we can find a way to improve the educational experience for our children at Foothill Elementary.




