What an incredible start of our school year! Thank you for your support and generous donations to Foothill Elementary in helping us not only match the \$150,000 grant for technology, but to help us raise more than \$180,000, all of which will be matched. The amazing part of this grant has been the united effort of our PTA, teachers, our district, and local business. The Fall Festival and Book Fair monies represent the support of hundreds of Foothill families. In addition, we have had over 70 families donate specifically to our grant. Twenty-two of our busy teachers applied for grants and received them. Alpine School District has donated a significant amount to our grant as well. We have had multiple businesses partner with Foothill and have given generously.

In addition to the amazing donations we have received, many have partnered together to ensure this incredible endeavor will happen successfully. The district is ensuring we have the necessary infrastructure, technician support, and professional development as we utilize technology to enhance and accelerate student learning. We have had conversations with businesses to partner in a greater effort to improve education. Also, we have spoken with leaders at the state level who are looking to Foothill as a pilot school to learn from as they propose legislation this coming year. Those we have spoken with have caught our vision of helping all students learn at deeper levels through STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) education.

At Foothill, technology will serve as an accelerator to student learning. Technology is not a 'squirrel' that is now distracting us away from what we have been doing. 

A concussion is a temporary loss of normal brain function, due to the brain shifting inside the skull from a blow to the head. The brain is made up of soft issue and it's cushioned by blood and spinal fluid. When someone gets a blow to the head or hits something very hard, the brain suddenly shifts inside the skull and can knock against the skull's bony surface. This causes a concussion.

Sometimes, concussions last for a short time. Other times, a person can have symptoms of a concussion that last for days or weeks. But even concussions that seem to be short can be serious.

Anyone who sustains a head injury should stop participating and be removed from the activity or sport. Even without a loss of consciousness, it's important to watch for symptoms of a concussion.

Common initial symptoms include:

- \*a change in level of alertness
- \*extreme sleepiness
- \*a bad headache
- \*confusion
- \*repeated vomiting
- \*seizure

### SOMEONE WITH ANY OF THESE SYMPTOMS SHOULD BE TAKEN TO THE EMERGENCY ROOM!

Concussion symptoms may not appear initially and can develop over the first 24-72 hours. Young children can have the same concussion symptoms as older kids and adults, but changes in mood and behavior may be less noticeable.

Though most people recover quickly from concussions, some symptoms, including memory loss, headaches, and problems with concentration may linger for several weeks or months. It's important to watch for these symptoms and contact your doctor if they persist.
