## principal's message Dr. Joseph Backman

Our theme at Foothill Elementary this year is "Leaving a Legacy." We desire to teach our students to be kind and make a difference in the world. While academic achievement is clearly our main focus, this endeavor would not fully serve our students unless our children learn to be kind, find joy in their lives, and learn how to make a difference in the world. Positive Psychology is a new field in the research world. "Positive Psychology is the scientific study of the strengths that enable individuals and communities to thrive. The field is founded on the belief that people want to lead meaningful and fulfilling lives, to cultivate what is best within themselves, and to enhance their experiences of love, work, and play" (Mission of the Positive Psychology Center at the University of Pennsylvania).

As we do our best to help students learn by improving instruction through professional learning like STEAM, we desire to improve our ability to help students learn the science of positive psychology. We want to intentionally teach our students so they can develop characteristics such as kindness, creativity, curiosity, integrity, honesty, work, compassion, resilience, respect, responsibility, optimism, friendship, forgiveness, and wisdom. Like learning math or reading, children need to learn and develop these positive traits by being explicitly taught, to be shown, and to experience these qualities for themselves. I believe the best setting for this to occur is in the home. At Foothill Elementary, we desire to support you as parents in helping your students learn these important characteristics through positive education.

Last year as a faculty we read "Mindset," a great book about having a growth mindset where one sincerely believes they can learn and grow by consistent effort, practice, and work. We were able to share what we learned with students to help them thrive more fully in the classroom and in life. This year, we have talked about the message of "Pay It Forward" by Catherine Ryan Hyde. The philosophy of Pay It Forward is to do more acts of kindness to others, which we refer to as our Kindness Campaign. When students are seen doing something kind they are given a leaf to put up on one of our Leaving a Legacy trees in our hallway. At Foothill, we desire to Pay It Forward through kind acts to others among our teachers and students and believe that this will cultivate an even happier and more caring environment in our classrooms and school.

As we Pay It Forward and focus on teaching the whole child at Foothill Elementary, I believe our students will continue to excel academically as well as emotionally. They will be happier in life and will develop essential characteristics to leave a legacy in our school, community, and world.

#### **DECEMBER STUDENT COUNCIL SERVICE PROJECT**


For the Student Council service project starting November 30th, we are joining Project Teddy Bear and collecting teddy bears. You can donate your new or clean, gently used stuffed animals at Foothill Elementary. There will be a collection box near the main office. We will then take them to a Bank of American Fork branch. The Bank of American Fork will hold a presentation of the stuffed animals on December 17th at 11 A.M. at the American Fork branch.

"Project Teddy Bear is a community service project sponsored by Bank of American Fork. These teddy bears will be given to the Utah Valley Family Support & Treatment Center in Orem, Salt Lake Valley Family Support Center (locations in Midvale, Taylorsville, West Valley City and Sugarhouse), House of Hope (SLC, Provo and Ogden) and Family Connection Center (in Layton/Clearfield and Bountiful).

These centers have the mission of preventing and treating child abuse through education, therapy and outreach. Crisis nurseries are available for children who have been abused, are in danger of being abused or are awaiting placement in a foster home. A soft teddy bear to hug during these times of trauma or loneliness is a great comfort to the children. At-risk children also undergo therapy sessions at the centers throughout the year. A teddy bear gives them something to hold during sessions, provides much-needed comfort and helps in the healing process. It may also be the only Christmas present a child receives."

#### **NURSING NEWS**

Dear Parents,

The "flu" season is officially underway. Individuals who received their vaccine at least two weeks ago can breathe a sign of relief, because it takes about two weeks to build immunity. You need the vaccine each year because the influenza virus changes, sometimes significantly, from year to year.

The vaccine comes in two basic forms—the shot and nasal spray. The "shot" contains killed virus and the nasal spray contains weakened live virus. NEITHER VACCINE CAUSES INFLUENZA!!!! The most common side effects from a flu shot are a sore arm and maybe a low fever or achiness. The flu mist might cause congestion, runny nose, sore throat, or cough. If you do have any side effects, they are usually mild and short-lived. These side effects mean that your body is producing antibodies against the actual influenza which is a very good thing!!!!

The vaccine is the BEST WAY to protect against influenza. Flu vaccines have been given for more than 50 years and they have a very good safety track record. Flu vaccines are made the same way each year and their safety is closely monitored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration. Hundreds of millions of flu vaccines have been given safely!

It's not too late to get vaccinated! To get your flu vaccine, come to the Utah County Health Department or visit your doctor.

# ASD Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.) Testing Saturdays – January 9th to January 30th 2016

The Alpine School District (ASD) Gifted Services department will be conducting 8 sessions of testing for placements in the district A. L. L. classrooms for the 2016-2017 school year. Any interested  $2^{nd}$  grader through  $7^{th}$  grader in ASD is invited to attend a testing session to qualify for a placement in an Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.). The testing will occur according to the schedule below. All  $2^{nd}$ - $7^{th}$  graders interested in a placement for the next year will **have to test** for original placement in the A.L.L. program. If students are currently in an elementary or secondary A.L.L. program they do not need to retest if they have completed the intent to continue form. However, all  $6^{th}$  grade students must retest for placement between the elementary and secondary level. Testing for secondary A.L.L. is for designated English, History and Science classes. Math testing and placement is completed at individual schools.

Testing for both Elementary and Secondary Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.) programs will be done on Saturdays, January  $9^{th}$  to January  $30^{th}$ . The online registration is now open and will close the Tuesday prior to each testing session. There will be a \$20.00 fee for the testing. Students on free or reduced lunch status will register on-line with a reduced cost. Registering within three days of testing is considered a late registration and will incur an additional \$5.00 fee. Late registrants will be admitted upon availability. There are no refunds.

Testing time includes the check-in process. Testers may bring a bottle of water, a simple snack and book. All other testing materials will be provided. If your child has testing accommodations through an IEP or 504 please contact Gifted Services (staylor@alpinedistrict.org) prior to the testing date to arrange for necessary accommodations.

#### Advanced Learning Lab (A.L.L.) Programs

Important Testing Information For Placement in the 2015-2016 School Year

Various programs are necessary to meet the diverse needs of academically advanced students. In order to address some of these needs, Alpine School District has established classes at an advanced level for third through eighth grade called A.L.L. (Advanced Learning Lab) **A.L.L. programs are located in nine different elementary schools and every junior high/middle school.** (See the website for magnet site information at <a href="www.alpineschools.org">www.alpineschools.org</a> select schools then programs) A.L.L. is a full day program at specific elementary schools, and is a subject specific program at secondary schools. Students are placed according to nationally normed testing results and a written essay.

The purpose of this letter is to inform all parents/guardians of 2<sup>nd</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> graders about the opportunity to test for possible placement in an A.L.L. program. Qualifying students will be offered placement and invited to meet with the teacher to learn more about specific magnet site offerings. The identified students and their parents/guardians will then make the final decision to accept or decline placement.

#### POSSIBLE INDICATORS TO CONSIDER PRIOR TO HAVING A STUDENT TESTED:

- The student's Utah State SAGE test scores are a 4 in Language Arts, Math and Science.
- The student is reading at two or more grade levels above current grade.
- The current classroom teacher has suggested during a Parent/ Teacher Conference that the student could benefit from a more complex or in-depth curriculum as offered in a gifted program.
- The student learns quickly, recalls information effortlessly, is curious, self-motivated, works independently and typically remains committed to a task until its completion.
- The student exhibits satisfactory to outstanding citizenship in both attitude and behavior.
- The student has good school attendance and is committed to the program for two years.
- The student completes homework in a timely manner, has task commitment for long-term projects.
- The student initiates his/her own learning through questioning and research.

#### ADDITIONAL SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION TO CONSIDER:

- The A.L.L. candidates must qualify for the program through a series of evaluations. The top students are offered placement, and an additional four to six become alternates in a "candidate pool."
- Evaluations for elementary students include taking the full battery Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT), secondary students taking the IOWA assessment in Reading, Writing, Social Studies and Science. All students will take a timed writing test based on a given prompt. Please note secondary mathematics is not tested through Gifted Services. This testing is done at the Junior High or Middle School.
- A.L.L. students will have assignments/homework that are greater in depth, breadth and complexity than in a regular class.
- For the elementary programs, parents are responsible for transportation to the A.L.L. site. Students attend the school closest to their boundary (see the website for school locations www.curriculum.alpineschools.org/gifted-services
- For secondary programs, students must register for the school within their school boundary.
