Happy New Year! I hope you had a wonderful Christmas break with your family and those you love. At Foothill Elementary, we are committed to teaching the whole child. We desire to help every student become creative, critical problem solvers, and to love learning so they can be successful and happy in life, and contribute to the world. A framework that describes Foothill extremely well comes from the Partnership for 21st Century Learning (http://www.p21.org).



The 21st Century Learning framework is grounded in a positive learning environment. Our theme this year is "Leaving a Legacy through Kindness." We desire that our students will love coming to school because they feel loved and know that they make a difference. We desire for them to live the Foothill Four (Courage, Courtesy, Responsibility, and Respect) and Dr. B's Challenge (see end of my message). We know the learning environment is essential for learning.

The top of the framework describes STEAM perfectly with the 4Cs: Critical thinking, Communication, Collaboration, and Creativity. As a STEAM school, we purposefully integrate all of the key subjects to ensure students learn these 4Cs. Also, our epic grant and efforts to purposefully utilize technology in STEAM help students prepare for career, college, and ultimately for life.

Teachers are the most important part to student learning and are foundational in all that we do. The things we do as a Professional Learning Community (weekly Monday collaboration, professional development, curriculum/instruction, and standards/ assessments to name a few) support teachers in their work and help build capacity as each of us continually learn.

At the end of January, a team of teachers and I will be traveling to Boston to learn how to become even better at what we do. We will visit a 21st Century Learning School, the Museum of Science in Boston, MIT, and a school district implementing technology particularly well. We are in the process of applying to become a 21st Century Learning exemplary school (only 40 exemplary schools in the nation) since we are living these things already and hope to continue to improve. We would be the first 21st Century Learning school not only in Utah, but also in all of Utah's neighboring states. At Foothill, we truly desire to leave a legacy one child at a time as we continue to lead our district and state!

NURSING NEWS

Every parent's nightmare is a medical emergency involving your child. Knowing when to call 911 can help you cope quickly and efficiently with childhood emergencies and stay calm under pressure!

HERE ARE SOME GUIDELINES FOR 7 OF THE MOST COMMON MEDICAL EMERGENCIES IN CHILDREN:

1. Respiratory Distress refers to difficulty breathing and taking in enough oxygen. Causes may include choking, asthma, an infection, or pneumonia. The symptoms are coughing, wheezing, flaring of nostrils, use of chest and neck muscles to aid breathing, grunting, inability to talk, or turning blue.

WHEN TO CALL 911: rate of breathing is greater than 50-60 breaths per minute, the child is turning blue around the mouth, or the condition is worsening instead of improving.

IF THESE SIGNS ARE PRESENT, DON'T TRY TO PUT YOUR CHILD IN A CAR—CALL AN AMBULANCE! THE PARAMEDICS CAN DELIVER OXYGEN AND GET YOUR CHILD SAFELY TO THE HOSPITAL.

2. Broken Bones are common childhood emergencies. While these injuries are generally not life-threatening, the child should be taken to a hospital or urgent care center for evaluation.

WHEN TO CALL 911: the break is so severe that you can't control the pain, the bone is sticking out of the skin, the accident involves trauma to the head or neck, the accident has caused a state of altered consciousness.

3. Vomiting and/or Diarrhea can require emergency care if a child becomes dehydrated. Watch for signs of dehydration such as sunken eyes, dry mucus membranes, and abnormally low amounts of urine.

WHEN TO CALL 911: the child is unresponsive, there is severe cramping and unrelenting abdominal pain. This could indicate appendicitis or kidney stones.

4. Febrile Seizures are caused by a rapid rise in temperature. Most seizures associated with fever end quickly and are not necessarily emergencies. However, any child who is having a new seizure should be seen by a doctor as soon as possible.

WHEN TO CALL 911: the seizure doesn't stop after three to five minutes, the child has labored breathing or is turning blue, your child's normal mental state does not return after the seizure.

5. Falls from a significant height can injure the head, spine, or internal organs. If you suspect a head injury, talk to your child and make sure he or she answers questions appropriately.

WHEN TO CALL 911: the child vomits more than once, he or she loses consciousness, the child complains of numbness or tingling, you suspect internal injuries, you suspect an injury to the neck or spine. DO NOT ATTEMPT TO MOVE YOUR CHILD! The paramedics will immobilize the spine before taking your child to the hospital.

6. Cuts/Bleeding- if your child is bleeding, apply pressure to the wound and assess the extent of the damage. Children who need stitches can usually be taken to the hospital or urgent care center by car.

WHEN TO CALL 911: there is a known bleeding disorder, you are unable to stop the bleeding.

7. Possible Poisoning is a frightening scenario. Perhaps your child has gotten into the medicine cabinet or your supply of household cleaners. THE FIRST THING TO DO IS CALL POISON CONTROL: 1-800-222-1222. The poison center experts can assess a situation and dispense advice quickly.

WHEN TO CALL 911: if the child is unresponsive, Poison Control advises it.

ASD Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.) Testing Saturdays – January 9th to January 30th 2016

The Alpine School District (ASD) Gifted Services department will be conducting 8 sessions of testing for placements in the district A. L. L. classrooms for the 2016-2017 school year. Any interested 2nd grader through 7th grader in ASD is invited to attend a testing session to qualify for a placement in an Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.). The testing will occur according to the schedule below. All 2nd-7th graders interested in a placement for the next year will **have to test** for original placement in the A.L.L. program. If students are currently in an elementary or secondary A.L.L. program they do not need to retest if they have completed the intent to continue form. However, all 6th grade students must retest for placement between the elementary and secondary level. Testing for secondary A.L.L. is for designated English, History and Science classes. Math testing and placement is completed at individual schools.

Testing for both Elementary and Secondary Advanced Learning Lab (A. L. L.) programs will be done on Saturdays, January 9^{th} to January 30^{th} . The online registration is now open and will close the Tuesday prior to each testing session. There will be a \$20.00 fee for the testing. Students on free or reduced lunch status will register on-line with a reduced cost. Registering within three days of testing is considered a late registration and will incur an additional \$5.00 fee. Late registrants will be admitted upon availability. There are no refunds.

Testing time includes the check-in process. Testers may bring a bottle of water, a simple snack and book. All other testing materials will be provided. If your child has testing accommodations through an IEP or 504 please contact Gifted Services (<u>staylor@alpinedistrict.org</u>) prior to the testing date to arrange for necessary accommodations.

Advanced Learning Lab (A.L.L.) Programs

Important Testing Information For Placement in the 2015-2016 School Year

Various programs are necessary to meet the diverse needs of academically advanced students. In order to address some of these needs, Alpine School District has established classes at an advanced level for third through eighth grade called A.L.L. (Advanced Learning Lab) **A.L.L. programs are located in nine different elementary schools and every junior high/middle school.** (See the website for magnet site information at www.alpineschools.org select schools then programs) A.L.L. is a full day program at specific elementary schools, and is a subject specific program at secondary schools. Students are placed according to nationally normed testing results and a written essay.

The purpose of this letter is to inform all parents/guardians of 2nd-7th graders about the opportunity to test for possible placement in an A.L.L. program. Qualifying students will be offered placement and invited to meet with the teacher to learn more about specific magnet site offerings. The identified students and their parents/guardians will then make the final decision to accept or decline placement.

POSSIBLE INDICATORS TO CONSIDER PRIOR TO HAVING A STUDENT TESTED:

- The student's Utah State SAGE test scores are a 4 in Language Arts, Math and Science.
- The student is reading at two or more grade levels above current grade.
- The current classroom teacher has suggested during a Parent/ Teacher Conference that the student could benefit from a more complex or in-depth curriculum as offered in a gifted program.
- The student learns quickly, recalls information effortlessly, is curious, self-motivated, works independently and typically remains committed to a task until its completion.
- The student exhibits satisfactory to outstanding citizenship in both attitude and behavior.
- The student has good school attendance and is committed to the program for two years.
- The student completes homework in a timely manner, has task commitment for long-term projects.
- The student initiates his/her own learning through questioning and research.

ADDITIONAL SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION TO CONSIDER:

- The A.L.L. candidates must qualify for the program through a series of evaluations. The top students are offered placement, and an additional four to six become alternates in a "candidate pool."
- Evaluations for elementary students include taking the full battery Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT), secondary students taking the IOWA assessment in Reading, Writing, Social Studies and Science. All students will take a timed writing test based on a given prompt. Please note secondary mathematics is not tested through Gifted Services. This testing is done at the Junior High or Middle School.
- A.L.L. students will have assignments/homework that are greater in depth, breadth and complexity than in a regular class.
- For the elementary programs, parents are responsible for transportation to the A.L.L. site. Students attend the school closest to their boundary (see the website for school locations www.curriculum.alpineschools.org/gifted-services
- For secondary programs, students must register for the school within their school boundary.
