Principal's Message - Mr. Jeremy Brunner

How can you get the most of Parent-Teacher Conferences? This week, we will be holding our first Parent-Teacher Conferences of the year. I wanted to share my thoughts on steps you could take to ensure that these conferences are a valuable tool for shaping your child's educational experience for the remainder of the school year.

The most important thing is that you come to Parent-Teacher Conferences. The parents in this community value education, and our Parent-Teacher Conferences are always well attended, but there are always a few parents who cannot seem to find the time to come. I hope each one of you will make meeting with your child's teacher a priority next week.

When you come to meet with your child's teacher, be prepared to have a sincere conversation about your child's strengths and areas in which he or she can improve. Ask good questions. Find out how your child is performing and what his or her teacher's plan is to prepare your child for advancement to the next grade.

Share your concerns with the teacher. Do you feel like the communication from your child's teacher is adequate, or does it need to be improved? Is your child happy at school? Does he or she have friends? How is the quality of the relationship between your child and the teacher? What kinds of things work at home to help your child be motivated and excited about learning?

Also, be mindful of the clock. There may only be a few minutes before the teacher needs to move on to the next parent. If you would like more time, please arrange a follow-up time to meet again to finish your conversation. Attending Parent-Teacher Conferences is a great opportunity to enhance the partnership between school and home. I hope you will take the time and visit with your child's teacher. Thank you.

Nursing News

October 2017

One of the most common calls I make to parents is because their child has a reddened eye. "Conjunctivitis" or "PinkEye" is common in young children. It is contagious and breakouts can sweep through schools and playgrounds. Even teens and adults can get pinkeye.

Pinkeye is caused by many of the bacteria and viruses responsible for colds and other infections-including ear infections, sinus infections, and sore throats.

Some kinds of pinkeye are noninfectious, such as: allergic conjunctivitis caused by hayfever, grass, ragweed pollen, animal dander, and dust mites. Irritant conjunctivitis is also noninfectious and is caused by anything that irritates the eyes such as air pollution or chlorine in pools.

Signs and symptoms of pinkeye include: eye discomfort, discharge from the eye, pain and swelling of the conjunctiva, swollen eyelids or sensitivity to bright lights. Pinkeye can affect one or both eyes.

PINKEYE IS CONTAGIOUS IF IT'S CAUSED BY BACTERIA OR A VIRUS:

- -Pinkeye that's caused by bacteria can spread to others as soon as symptoms appear and for as long as there's discharge from the eye, or until 24 hours after antibiotics are started.
- -Pinkeye that's caused by a virus is generally contagious before symptoms appear and can remain so as long as the symptoms last

A child can get pinkeye by touching an infected person or something an infected person has touched such as desktops and other surfaces, a used tissue, a pencil or crayons. In the summertime, pinkeye can spread when kids swim in contaminated water or share contaminated towels. It also can spread through coughing and sneezing.

Someone who has pinkeye in one eye can spread it to the other eye by rubbing or touching the infected eye, then touching the other eye.

Pinkeye caused by a virus usually goes away without any treatment. Pinkeye caused by a bacteria is treated with antibiotic eye drops or ointment. THESE EYE DROPS OR OINTMENTMUST BE USED FOR 24 HOURS BEFORE YOUR CHILD IS ALLOWED TO RETURN TO SCHOOL.

If the pinkeye does not improve after 2 to 3 days of treatment, or after a week if untreated, call your doctor. If your child has increased swelling, redness and tenderness in the eyelids and around the eye, along with a fever, call your doctor. Those symptoms may mean the infection has started to spread beyond the conjunctiva and will need further treatment.

Dance Choreography: Solo and ensemble works of all dance styles are accepted. Entrant must be the choreographer and may also be the performer, or one of the performers. If background music is used, cite it on the entry form. Video file must not exceed 5 min. and 1 GB in size. Accepted formats: AVI, FLV, WMV, MOV, MP4.

Film Production: Accepted short film styles include: Animation, narrative, documentary, experimental or media presentation. Use of Power Point is prohibited. Entrant must be the screenwriter, cinematographer, editor and producer. If background music is used, cite it on the entry form. Video file must not exceed 5 min. and 1 GB in size. Accepted formats: AVI, FLV, WMV, MOV, MP4.

Literature: Accepted forms of fiction and nonfiction include: Prose, poetry, reflective essay, screen play and play script, narrative, and short story. Entrants may write in their primary language as long as an interpretive English translation is also attached. Use of copyrighted material is prohibited. Writing must not exceed 2,000 words and may be handwritten or typed. Accepted formats: Single-sided print on 8 1/2x11" paper, PDF file.

Music Composition: All music styles and combinations of instrumentation are accepted. Entrant must be the composer and may also be the performer, or one of the performers. Use of copyrighted material is prohibited. Audio file must not exceed 5 min. and 1 GB in size. Accepted formats: MP3, WMA, WAV, ACC, FLAC. Notation (score/tabulature) in PDF format is only required for middle and high school divisions.

Photography: Photo must be a single print/digital image. Collages and collections of photos are not accepted. Entrant must be the photographer and may use a variety of digital editing techniques including but not limited to, multiple exposure, negative sandwich and photogram. Use of copyrighted material is prohibited. Print image dimensions must be no smaller than 3x5 inches and no larger than 8x10 inches. Accepted print formats: Mounted on mat or poster board no larger than 11x14 inches. Framed prints are not accepted. Digital image dimensions must be at least 640x960 (pixels) and 300 dpi (resolution). Accepted file formats: JPEG, JPG, GIF, PNG.

Visual Arts: Works of both fine and design arts are accepted, including but not limited to: architectural drawing and models, ceramics, collage, computer generated images and graphics, crafts, drawing, fashion clothes and jewelry, fiber work, mixed media, painting, printmaking and sculpture. Use of copyrighted material is prohibited. 2D artworks must be mounted on sturdy material and no larger than 24x30 inches with matting. Framed entries are not accepted. Include one digital image of artwork with your submission. 3D artwork submissions must contain 3 digital images of artwork at different angles. Image(s) are used for artwork identification, judging and exhibition purposes.

Students who identify as having a disability and may receive services under IDEA or ADA: Section 504 may enter in the Special Artist Division or grade division most closely aligned to their functional abilities. The Special Artist Division welcomes all grades and all abilities and offers non-artistic accommodations (e.g. adaptive technology; transcribing; holding a camera) for students to participate fully in PTA Reflections. Student assistants must refrain from being involved in the artistic process (e.g. developing an artist statement, choreography, music lyrics, storyboards, etc. Student recognition and awards are announced as part of the Special Artist Division.

By submitting an artwork to the "National PTA Reflections Program," entrants accept and agree to be bound by the official rules for participation as well as the entry requirements for their specific arts category and division. Additional state program requirements may apply. Any violation of these rules
