
A Professional Learning Community

Legacy teachers meet together regularly to focus on student achievement and growth. Their collaborative efforts are guided by four essential questions:

- 1. What do we expect students to learn?
- 2. How will we know what students have learned?
- 3. How will we respond to students who aren't learning?
- 4. How will we respond to students who already know the material?

In response to these questions, each grade has developed common curriculum maps that govern the pacing and content of instruction. This common pacing allows teachers to compare assessment data together, for every student at their grade level, and to make decisions regarding the next steps for instruction. Teachers can also receive professional training focused on student needs. Everybody learns every day.





In order to achieve the State Level of Performance a school must have 95% participation, and either proficiency or progress in the Whole School and the Subgroup. *Overall proficiency: Acceptable range is 77% and higher. **Overall Progress: Acceptable range is 176 and higher.

School Goals 2009-2010

95% of students will pass the State Language Arts assessment.

90% of students will meet school established benchmarks in writing.

School Goals 2008-2009

Literacy: Increase the number of students passing the Language Arts Assessment from 91% to 94%.

Math: Increase the number of students passing the Math Assessment by 3%

Did we reach our goals?

Literacy: 93% of students demonstrated proficiency in Language Arts

Math: A new math assessment administered last year does not allow direct comparison to previous tests. Legacy showed a 2-4% increase in the margin of students passing when compared to district and state averages.
