Principal's Message

February/March 2013

As we move in to the second part of the school year I would like to again take this opportunity to remind you of what safety and security measures are implemented at Mount Mahogany.

Ultimately, there are three kinds of school emergencies—evacuations, lockdowns, and in-school sheltering. Evacuations include any emergency (fire, earthquake, etc.) that necessitates evacuating the building. Lockdowns include any emergency in which we need students and teachers to be secured in the building. In-school sheltering includes any emergency in which we need to keep students in the school for an extended period of time given circumstances (weather, environmental, etc.) outside of the building.

Evacuation and lockdown drills are practiced throughout the school year to familiarize students and staff with procedures should an actual emergency occur.

(1) Evacuation.

Teachers and students evacuate the building through prearranged routes to specified locations located on the east grounds of the school. Procedures are then followed to account for all students. If an evacuation happens during lunch or recess, both students and teachers proceed to their locations. If, in a real event the building remained inaccessible, our alternative evacuation site would be Pleasant Grove Junior High, located at 810 North 100 East.

(2) Lockdown.

A lockdown drill or alert is initiated over the intercom. When this happens teachers gather their students and any other student who might be outside their classroom. Students are moved away from windows, all doors are locked, blinds are closed, and students are accounted for. Teachers then wait for further instructions.

(3) In-School Sheltering.

"In-school" sheltering is initiated over the intercom. Teachers account for their students and, depending on the situation, additional actions are implemented. I would also like to remind you of these other safety precautions and procedures:

We ask that all parents or guardians who come to visit or volunteer in classrooms enter through the front doors and check in at the front office to get a Visitor's Pass before going anywhere in the building. Each door has a sign posted reminding you to do this.

All nonessential doors are locked throughout the day. At 9:15, after all "B track" and busing students have arrived, all entrances, with the exception of the main entrance, will be locked. If your student is late, they will need to enter through the front doors and check in at the office before going to class. For kindergarten students, during times of inclement weather, the southwest doors will be unlocked to allow them to enter the school and wait in the hallway until their classes begin. The doors will then be relocked.

When checking a student out, you will be asked to show a form of picture identification. Only those included on the student's emergency form will be allowed to check out students.

In extreme weather conditions, as we experienced during January, we use the following guidelines to determine whether or not recess will be held. If the temperature is below 20 degrees, it is an automatic inside recess day. We also watch closely the air quality index. When the air quality has reached a dangerous level, students will not be permitted to go outside.

If, at any time the need arises, we are in constant communication with our local police department for any assistance they might render. The police department is also making daily visits to the school as part of their routine and we are appreciative of their support.
