

Principal's Message



I remember, as if it were yesterday, a time when I was faced with a difficult situation. I was 18 years old and had logged around 150 hours as a private pilot. I was returning home from Lake Powell in an old Cessna 182.

Approximately 40 minutes into the flight, a few clouds appeared, but not enough to be too concerning. The headwinds picked up and about halfway over Price Canyon, dark clouds formed that cast off turbulence and hail. The sound of the hail pounding the small airplane was horrific.

Usually, I could fly around these summer thunderstorms. However, this had grown into a large-scale storm. Hail assaulted that old Cessna from every direction as it hit the aluminum frame. I changed headings and steered away from the dark clouds. I became increasingly nervous as I watched the fuel gage drop as I maneuvered further away from my destination. My three girlfriends were holding each other's hands and silently praying, which also added to my stress level.

I maneuvered the airplane away from the storm, but in doing so, burned more fuel than I had in reserve. I retrieved the map and tried to determine exactly where I was. At that point, I calculated that I didn't have enough fuel to make it to Provo.

I remember looking at my three terrified friends and thinking, I'm responsible for all of you. I assured them that everything was under control, but deep down I was terrified. This story had a happy ending. I landed safely and when the airplane rolled to a stop, my three friends climbed out of the airplane and literally kissed the ground. I was tempted to join them, but decided that would make them not want to get back inside the airplane to fly the rest of the way home.

Every day we are faced with situations that force our decision-making abilities beyond what we think we can do. However, reflecting back, we realize how much we grow from these experiences. Although my decision making process was tested that day, it taught me the value of being a good problem solver. Being a great problem solver is a skill that will enhance our students' abilities to handle conflict and difficult situations for the rest of their lives. Miss Hutchens





Healthy Hints: Turn Your Key, Be Idle Free Healthy Hints--by Ellie Bodily, RN-School Nurse

Each year, idling vehicles in the U.S. consume more than 2 billion gallons of diesel and gasoline—without even moving. Roughly half of that fuel is wasted by noncommercial passenger vehicles—the millions of individual drivers waiting "just a few minutes" to pick up friends or family, or waiting to move forward in line at a drive-thru. Unnecessary idling not only wastes fuel, but also contributes a significant amount of emissions into the air each day. This is especially concerning in Utah, where the Department of Environmental Quality estimates that vehicle exhaust accounts for more than 50% of the air pollution in our state. With many areas of the state in non-attainment for the national air quality standards, poor air quality has become a significant public health concern. Turning your key when stopped for more than 10-30 seconds is a small change with big return.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Use common sense. Driver and passenger safety is the number one priority.
- Park your car and put those legs to work rather than sitting in a drive-thru.
- Never turn your vehicle off in traffic unless experiencing a long delay where it is safe to do so.
- The best way to warm up your car is to drive it. Newer vehicles need no more than 30 seconds of idling time in cold temperatures.
- For temperatures below 5° Fahrenheit, use an engine block heater to warm the engine. This improves fuel efficiency and reduces emissions.
- Use remote starters wisely. Don't turn your vehicle on before you are ready to leave.

Troll Patrol Value of the Month: Be a Problem Solver

Most problems can be solved, or at least made better, by utilizing some basic problem solving skills. Some problems are larger than what one person can solve on their own. Other problems can be solved individually if we proactively seek solutions.

The Troll Patrol book, *Be a Problem Solver*, is about a young boy, Calvin, who is mean. He is the kind of kid that all the other students follow because they'd rather do what he says than be bullied by him. Mason, another character in the book, feels pressure from Calvin to do things he knows are wrong. With the help of a Hawaiian troll named Akamai, Mason learns how to recognize the problem and devises a plan to help solve it. The plan almost works, but fails because Mason forgot to think about Calvin's feelings.

Sometimes when solving problems, we forget to think about all the people who are impacted by the problem. Akamai, the problem solving troll, helps Mason learn to think of Calvin's feelings when solving the problem even though Calvin was the bully.

We want everyone to learn the pro-social skills, not just the victim (Mason) of bullying, but the perpetrator (Calvin) as well.

Throughout November, students learned the steps of being a good problem solver:

- 1. Understand what the problem is.
- 2. Create a plan to solve your problem.
- 3. Think of others' feelings in creating your plan.
- 4. Act on the plan.
- 5. Revise the plan if it doesn't work.
- 6. Ask for assistance if you need help with your problem.
- 7. Help others solve their problems.

When we empower students with the ability to solve problems, the rewards are great not only now, but for the rest of their lives.







Olav, guardian of the Troll Patrol cave, visited students in October to reward them for "Doing Hard Things". Olav commended children for creating their own kingdom of kindness. He had each child who earned 20 troll stamps on the back of their value bookmarks stand to receive a troll gem.

After students earn 4 gems, they will receive a gold value challenge coin that will be a lasting keepsake. These coins are similar to military challenge coins and should be special to the children for years to come. The coins and gems will also serve as a symbol of accomplishment and a constant reminder of what the Troll Patrol values are.
