FAMILY CONNECTION LESSON	
CONCEPTS TO REINFORCE:	Be courageous and always tell the truth
	Follow through on promises made
	Admit your mistakes
	Correct trades should have fair value on both sides
	Never do something you will want to lie about later
	Never take someone else's property or ideas
	Always return what you borrow
MATERIALS:	• Yarn (several feet)
ACTIVITY:	Instructions: For this activity you will need several feet of yarn. Have a child help you by making up outrageous lies while you question him. Each time he tells a lie, wrap the yarn around him. See sample below.
	Child: My dad and I went camping and we caught a tiger. (Wrap the yarn around him once.)
	PARENT: A tiger? Are you sure? Tigers don't live around here except in zoos.
	Child: Well this tiger escaped from the circus. (Wrap the yarn around him again.)
	PARENT: I don't think there have been any circuses in town lately.
	Child: Yeah, there was one last week. My friend told me. (Wrap twice for two lies.)
ACTIVITY TALKING POINTS:	The child is all tied up in the lies he's told
	The child is no longer free
	Now he has to remember what lies he told, or tell more lies
	It is better to tell the truth from the beginning

FAMILY DISCUSSION:	Sometimes, we get great story ideas we'd like to share to entertain people, and that is okay as long as we don't pretend the story we're telling is true. For example, we could say, "Wouldn't it be cool if we went camping and caught a tiger? We could pretend it escaped from the circus and we caught it and returned it so we could get into the circus free." That would be okay because we aren't saying it really happened.
Conclusion:	If you are not honest with others, they will soon learn they cannot trust you. Being trustworthy will help you keep friends and help you in your relationships with teachers, siblings, coaches, and parents. Honesty in the workplace is also important. Talk individually with your child(ren) who have difficulty being honest and help them set goals to become more trustworthy.
