Principal's Message

Dear Parents:

January was quite the month with a record number of "in days" due to high particulate counts. extreme temperatures, and/or heavy precipitation. In contrast, what a beautiful day we enjoyed on February 1, with warmer temperatures and a clear blue sky! have now moved into the second semester, and our younger grades enjoyed celebrating the 100th day of the school year this past week. Also during the month of January, each grade level completed the Winter DRA (Direct Reading Assessment), invited 4th graders completed the NAEP (National of Educational Progress) Assessment assessment, and all 3rd graders were given the CogAT (Cognitive Abilities Test) screener. In the month of February, our 5th graders will be doing their DWA (Direct Writing Assessment), and invited 6th graders will be responding to the SHARP It seems we are in a constant process of gathering data to help us monitor how our students are learning, progressing, and adjusting as they go through their school experience.

Monday, February 4, will be a Minimal Day schedule to facilitate an afternoon of Professional Development for our faculty. Our focus this time will be on improving

student achievement in the area of writing. With writing becoming such an integral part of all subject areas, teachers will focus on lessons to help students develop common vocabulary a variety of writing strategies and skills. We will also be working together to develop common assessments and rubrics to monitor student progress in their writing.

I encourage each of you to make sure you attend our Parent Teacher Conferences this coming week on Tuesday and Thursday, February 5 and 7. It is a great opportunity for teachers and parents to celebrate areas of strength, progress and growth, and to discuss areas where you can work together for continued improvement and success. There is a strong positive effect on student learning when parents and teachers partner together in the education process.

Our Jazz Reader Contest launched on January 18, and will end on February 19. It has been a delight to see the excitement about reading among our students as they work to reach classroom, grade level, and school wide goals. We parent appreciate support and encouragement to make sure minutes reported are accurate and honest. I am especially grateful to our PTAmembers who, under the coordination of Cynthia Ruchti, have worked so hard to facilitate such activities as Moms and Family Reading Muffins. Night, the Before/After School Read-a-Thon, and Dads and Doughnuts. These are all fun providing opportunities of ways students to celebrate the joy of reading.

How to order your yearbook on line:

Go to www.inter-state.com/store/preorder (wait a minute in time for it to load)

- 1. Enter flyer code 268949
- 2. Make sure you are on the Shelley Elementary link
- 3. Click on Order Yearbook
- 4. Enter student's name and click on Lookup
- 5. Select your student from list
- 6. Click add to cart
- 7. Double check to make sure order is correct
- 8. Click checkout
- 9. Register and check out following prompts

Alpine School District Elementary Attendance Information

In order for your child to fully benefit from the opportunities offered in his or her school experience, please ensure that he/she attends each day, on time. From time to time, it may become necessary to miss school. This document contains information that will help you understand state and district policies and procedures related to school attendance. If you have any questions regarding this information or your particular situation, please do not hesitate to contact the principal.

Utah Code: The Utah State Compulsory Education Requirements (Utah Code, Section 53A-11-101.5) is the law regarding elementary school attendance. Part of that law reads as follows: (2) a person having control of a minor between 6 and 18 years of age shall send the minor to a public or regularly established private school during the school year of the district in which the minor resides. (3) It is a class B misdemeanor for a parent to intentionally or recklessly fail to prevent the school-age child from being absent without a valid excuse 5 or more times in a school year. (5) It is a class B misdemeanor for a parent of a school age minor to intentionally or recklessly fail to enroll the school age minor in school, unless the school age minor is exempt from enrollment under Section 53A-11-102 or 53A-11-102.5. (7)...the school district shall report violations of this section to the appropriate county attorney...

Alpine District Policy: The Board of Education has approved Elementary School Attendance Policy No. 5158 which defines an excused absence as an illness, family death, approved school activity, absence permitted by the student's IEP plan or any other excuse established as valid by a local school administrator. If the student has excessive unexcused absences, the school will make earnest and persistent efforts to remedy the situation by making phone calls, sending letters, holding meetings with parents and children, making referrals to the district social worker and, possibly, to local law enforcement. A letter will be sent home to parents after 5, 10, and 15 unexcused absences. *If a child is excused due to illness more than 10 times the school may require a doctor's note to verify the seriousness of the illness.*

Excused Absences: When a child is absent, the parent/guardian should call or send a note to excuse the child from school within five school days of their return to school. Parents are welcome to meet with the principal to discuss extended absences.

Tardies: Tardies are recorded (on Skyward) as "T" = unexcused tardy, "V" = very tardy, "L" = excused tardy. A "T" or "V" can be changed to an "L" with a parent note within five days.

School Messenger: Teachers take attendance every day at 9:30 a.m. The *School Messenger* calling system will then contact homes of students who are marked "unexcused absent."

Checking on Attendance: Student attendance and grades are available via the Internet on Skyward. Parents can obtain their student's access information from their school secretary or principal.

Policy No. 5158

1.0 ATTENDANCE POLICY FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

- 1.1 The Alpine School District Board of Education recognizes that regular daily attendance at school increases opportunities for students to profit from educational instruction and benefits students' academic learning. The Board further recognizes that the Utah Compulsory Attendance Law (53A-11-101.5) directs the parent/guardian to enroll and send school-age minors to a public or regularly established private school during the school year of the district in which the school-age minor resides, except as provided in Section 53A-11-102 and 53A-11-102.5.
- 1.2 In order to support elementary student attendance and the associated learning that occurs in schools, it is expected that each local school will make Earnest and Persistent Efforts (EPE) to cooperate with the parent/guardian to ensure regular school attendance.

1.3 Guidelines

- 1.3.1 Students are expected to attend class, on time, every school day, unless properly excused by a parent or guardian.
- 1.3.2 Teachers will keep rolls and record accurate daily attendance for all students assigned to their classes.
- 1.3.3 Teachers will report to the principal anytime their class absences exceed 10% of enrollment.
- 1.3.4 Electronic roll books are the official attendance records of Alpine School District and will be available for inspection in accordance with the district records policy.
- 1.3.5 Teachers should contact the parent or guardian after three consecutive student absences. Unexcused absences will be referred to the appropriate authority.
- 1.3.6 Elementary schools maintain a closed campus. Students should not leave the school grounds from the time school begins in the morning until it ends in the afternoon. Parents or guardians may authorize students to go home for lunch with an annual written release. Students may be checked out in the office by a parent or guardian or, in the event on an emergency, by those designated on the emergency release form.
- 1.3.7 Excuses for absences typically include an illness, a family death, an approved school activity, an absence approved by the child's IEP, Accommodation Plan or any other excuse established as valid by the local school <u>administration</u>. An extended absence can be preapproved if the school collaborates with the parent/guardian to define the absence and provide reasonable make up opportunities.

IDEAS TO HELP YOUR CHILD SUCCEED IN SCHOOL

Going to school regularly is important to your child's future. Children who miss school frequently can fall behind with their work and do poorly on exams. Research suggests that children who attend school regularly are also at less risk of getting involved in crime and substance abuse.

You can promote good attendance when you:

- Make sure they understand the importance of good attendance and punctuality.
- Take an interest in their education; ask about school work and encourage them to get involved in school activities.
- Discuss any problems they may have at school; inform their teacher about anything serious.
- Do not let them take time off school for minor ailments; particularly those which would not prevent you from going to work.
- Establish and stick to the basic routines (going to bed early, waking up on time, etc.) that will help your child develop the habit of on-time attendance.
- Provide incentives and consequences for attendance and learning. Set daily, weekly or
 monthly goals and agree on rewards and punishments. When completed, follow through
 with the incentives and consequences and then set new goals.
- Come up with a back up plan for who to turn to (another family member, a neighbor or fellow parents) to help you get your child to school if something comes up (e.g. another child gets sick, your car breaks down, etc.).
- Reach out for help if you are experiencing tough times (e.g. transportation, unstable
 housing, loss of a job, health problems) that make it difficult to get your child to school.
 Other parents, your child's teacher, principal, social worker, school nurse, afterschool
 providers or community agencies can help you problem solve or connect you to a needed
 resource.
- If your child is absent, work with the teacher to make sure she or he has an opportunity to learn and make up for the academics missed.
- Arrange appointments and outings after school hours, on weekends or during a school holiday to prevent disruption to your child's education.
