#### Halloween Costumes

Each 1<sup>st</sup> thru 6<sup>th</sup> grade class will host a Halloween party for students from 12:25 to 1:25 p.m. and Kindergarten will hold theirs during the last hour of their class on Monday, October 31. Please note the following information, reprinted from our student handbook:

To protect the learning class time and provide for the safety of children during Halloween festivities, it is important to follow these guidelines: 1) All students are invited to wear costumes. Costumes are optional, not mandatory. They must come to school dressed in their costumes and be prepared to wear them all day. 2) No masks will be allowed. Students may wear only costumes which will not interfere with the educational process, since regular school lessons will continue. Students are not to wear costumes depicting or glorifying death or violence, or advertising alcohol, drugs, smoking, or containing obscenities. 5) No weapons (even toy or cardboard guns, swords, etc.) are acceptable.

### School Safety Plan

Each fall teachers go through extensive training in emergency and evacuation procedures for our school. We conduct eight emergency response and evacuation drills throughout the school year. In the event of a real evacuation emergency, we have orderly procedures set up to guard the safety and well-being of your children and to reunite them with you in an emergency situation. Included in this newsletter is a parent letter explaining these procedures in greater detail. Please take some time to read and understand the procedures so that should we ever need to mobilize our plan, you are prepared to respond appropriately.

Treats At School

The holidays are a time of celebrations which often include food. Please note the following guidelines regarding treats sent to school.

"Any foods served to students must be commercially prepared by a facility approved by the health department. No foods should be served that were prepared in a private home or non-commercial kitchen. This includes baked goods such as cookies, cupcakes, pies, breads, etc."

#### **Red Ribbon Week**

This year we will celebrate Red Ribbon Week during the week of October  $17^{th}$  - October  $19^{th}$ .

Please watch for more information coming. In the meantime enjoy this story of how Red Ribbon Week started.

The Story Behind the Symbol Enrique "Kiki" Camarena grew up in a dirt-floored house with hopes and dreams of making a difference.

Camarena worked his way through college, served in the Marines and became a police officer. When he decided to join the U.S. Drug

Enforcement Administration, his mother tried to talk him out of it. "I can't not do this," he told her. "I'm only one person, but I want to make a difference."

The DEA sent Camarena to work undercover in Mexico investigating a major drug cartel believed to include officers in the Mexican army, police and government. On Feb. 7, 1985, the 37-year-old Camarena left his office to meet his wife for lunch. Five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him in a car. One month later, Camarena's body was found in a shallow grave. He had been tortured to death.

Within weeks of his death in March of 1985, Camarena's Congressman, Duncan Hunter, and high school friend Henry Lozano, launched Camarena Clubs in Imperial Valley, California, Camarena's home. Hundreds of club members pledged to lead drug-free lives to honor the sacrifices made by Camarena and others on behalf of all Americans. These coalitions began to wear red badges of satin, red ribbons, as a symbol of Camarena's memory. The Red Ribbon Week campaign emerged from the efforts of these clubs and coalitions.

Today, Red Ribbon Week is nationally recognized and celebrated, helping to preserve Special Agent Camarena's memory and further the cause for which he gave his life. The Red Ribbon Campaign also became a symbol of support for the DEA's efforts to reduce demand for drugs through prevention and education programs. By wearing a red ribbon in October, Americans demonstrate their ardent opposition to drugs. They pay homage not only to Special Agent Camarena, but to all men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice in support of our nation's struggle against drug trafficking and abuse.

Monday October 17<sup>th</sup>---Wear red to school. Join us at lunch recess for an activity.

Tuesday October 18<sup>th</sup>---Wear crazy socks for "Sock It To Drugs Day". We will be having an assembly during school where the American Fork Police will come speak with us. Join us at lunch recess for an activity.

Wednesday October 19<sup>th</sup>---Wear your shirt backwards for "Turn Your Back On Drugs" day. Join us at lunch recess for an activity.

# Shelley Elementary School Safety and Emergency Plan 2011-2012

#### IMPORTANT SAFETY AND EMERGENCY PLAN/PROCEDURES

Dear Parents:

Should an emergency or disaster situation ever arise in our area while school is in session, we want you to be aware that the schools have made preparations to respond effectively to such situations. In fact, public schools in Utah are built to meet stringent construction standards and they may be safer than your own home in the event of a disaster.

Should we have a major earthquake or disaster during school hours, your student(s) will be cared for at this school until they are safely released to you or a designee. Shelley Elementary and Alpine School District have a detailed disaster plan that has been formulated to respond to a major catastrophe, including earthquakes. Your cooperation is necessary in any emergency. 1.) Do not telephone the school. Telephone lines may be needed for emergency communication. 2.) In the event of a serious earthquake, students will be kept at the school until they are picked up by an identified, responsible adult who has been designated as such on the Emergency and Health Form that is required to be filled out by parents at the beginning of every school year. Please be sure you consider the following criteria when you authorize other persons to pick up your child(ren) at school: they are 18 years of age; they could walk to school, if necessary; they are aware and able to assume responsibility; they are usually home during the day; and they are known to your child. 3.) Turn your radio to KSL 1160 AM for emergency announcements. If students are to be kept at school, radio stations will be notified. In addition, information regarding day-to-day school operations will be available by calling Alpine School District offices (801-610-8400) or by accessing the District website (http://alpineschools.org). 4. Impress upon your child(ren) the need for them to follow the directions of any school personnel in times of an emergency.

Students will be released only to parents or persons identified on the Emergency Health Form. During an extreme emergency, students will be released from grass areas located on the southeast end of the main building by the office staff. Parents will need to be patient with the student release process so the safe release of all students can be ensured. Please instruct your student to remain at school until you or a designee arrives.

The decision to keep students at school will be based upon whether or not streets in the area are open and safe. If this occurs, radio stations will be notified. In the event that a major earthquake takes place during the time that students are being transported (i.e. on a fieldtrip) and roads are impassable, students will be kept on the bus and the driver will ask for assistance through radio contact with the school and district personnel. In the event a major earthquake occurs and roads are open, the driver will make every attempt to deliver students back to Shelley, otherwise the students will be delivered to the nearest accessible public school site and that school will communicate with the home school to inform them of the students' whereabouts.

Lock-down procedures may be implemented in situations involving dangerous intruders or other incidents that may result in harm to persons inside or outside the school. The principal or her designee will issue lock-down notification procedures by way of the p.a. system, by sending a messenger to each classroom, or by sounding the lock-down bell signal. All students, staff and visitors who are in the hallways will be directed into the nearest classroom, whether they belong in that particular classroom or not. External doors and classroom doors will then be locked. Everyone should move away from the windows or doors of the classroom. Roll will be taken, noting any students who were present that day but are missing from the classroom as well as any extra students and visitors taken into the classroom. The office staff will contact each classroom by telephone to complete a student/staff/visitor accountability check. During this time classroom work will quietly continue as close to "normal" as possible unless directed to do otherwise. No one will be allowed to enter or leave classrooms until an all-clear signal is given by the principal or her designee.

Our main goal in any scenario is to ensure the safety and well being of our students. Please discuss these matters with your immediate family members. Planning ahead will help alleviate concern during emergencies.
