Principal's Message

Dear Parents:

January was quite the month at Shelley Elementary. Our students coming back from the holiday break and having, basically, uninterrupted instruction time has been very valuable to them and to their teachers. I wanted to give some information about how schools in the district decide whether or not to have an outside day in the winter. When I get to school in the morning on these cold days, I check the WeatherBug site for Freedom Elementary. Freedom is the closest elementary to Shelley that has a WeatherBug station. The instruction from the district has been if the outside temperature is 20 degrees Fahrenheit or above, we can line up outside, have lunch recess and our class recesses. I take into account the wind chill factor or other factors that could be safety issues to help make my decision. If the temperature is colder than 19 degrees, we will line up in the gym and we won't have outside recesses or activities. This monitoring goes on during the day so if the temperature does change, we will be able to have recess. Particulate matter (red, yellow, green days or indoor days) for schools follows guidance given from the air quality division of the State of Utah. I check their website at www.airquality.utah.gov each day at 10:55 a.m. for guidance on calling an indoor day (everyone stays inside because of air quality) or a restricted outdoor day (meaning those "sensitive students" or others

with respiratory symptoms need to stay inside for recess). If you have questions about these quidelines, please contact me for further clarification. We only have a few weeks remaining of the second trimester, and our younger grades enjoyed celebrating the 100th day of the school year this past week. Also during the month of January, each grade level completed the Winter DRA (Direct Reading Assessment). In the month of February, our 5th graders will be doing their DWA (Direct Writing Assessment. It seems we are in a constant process of gathering data to help us monitor how our students are learning, progressing, and adjusting as they go through their school experience.

In preparation for the SAGE testing that will take place this coming Spring, the State of Utah has opened the SAGE testing portal site, sageportal.org. This site has many resources for students, parents and teachers to begin preparing for SAGE testing. encourage each of you to access the site with your children and look at the information contained in it. There are practice tests, information rubrics, webinars and other helpful information that will help to prepare our students for this new testing system. If after accessing the site and you find that you need some guidance or explanation about things, please contact me so we can talk about your questions.

I encourage each of you to make sure you attend our Parent Teacher Conferences this coming week on Tuesday and Thursday, February 4 and 6. It is a great opportunity for teachers and parents to celebrate areas of strength, progress and growth, and to discuss areas where you can work together for continued improvement and success. There is a strong positive effect on student learning when parents and teachers partner together in the education process.

Our Jazz Reader Contest was launched on January 17, and will end on February 18. It has been a delight to see the excitement about reading among our students as they work to reach classroom, grade level, and We appreciate parent school wide goals. support and encouragement to make sure minutes reported are accurate and honest. I am also especially grateful to our PTA members who, under the coordination of Keri Miner, have worked so hard to facilitate such activities as Family Reading Night, Moms and Muffins and Dads and Doughnuts. These are all fun ways of providing opportunities for students to celebrate the joy of reading.

IDEAS TO HELP YOUR CHILD SUCCEED IN SCHOOL

Going to school regularly is important to your child's future. Children who miss school frequently can fall behind with their work and do poorly on exams. Research suggests that children who attend school regularly are also at less risk of getting involved in crime and substance abuse.

You can promote good attendance when you:

- Make sure they understand the importance of good attendance and punctuality.
- Take an interest in their education; ask about school work and encourage them to get involved in school activities.
- Discuss any problems they may have at school; inform their teacher about anything serious.
- Do not let them take time off school for minor ailments; particularly those which would not prevent you from going to work.
- Establish and stick to the basic routines (going to bed early, waking up on time, etc.) that will help your child develop the habit of on-time attendance.
- Provide incentives and consequences for attendance and learning. Set daily, weekly or monthly goals and agree on rewards and punishments. When completed, follow through with the incentives and consequences and then set new goals.
- Come up with a back up plan for who to turn to (another family member, a neighbor or fellow parents) to help you get your child to school if something comes up (e.g. another child gets sick, your car breaks down, etc.).
- Reach out for help if you are experiencing tough times (e.g. transportation, unstable
 housing, loss of a job, health problems) that make it difficult to get your child to school.
 Other parents, your child's teacher, principal, social worker, school nurse, afterschool
 providers or community agencies can help you problem solve or connect you to a needed
 resource.
- If your child is absent, work with the teacher to make sure she or he has an opportunity to learn and make up for the academics missed.
- Arrange appointments and outings after school hours, on weekends or during a school holiday to prevent disruption to your child's education.
