# 1<sup>ST</sup> GRADE NEWS

Writing is a fun adventure in First Grade. The students are given a variety of opportunities to write. All of the first grade students have a writing journal where they write about everyday experiences. Sometimes they are asked to write explanations on Math papers. They might be asked to write a list. One of the first grade classes did a project where they wrote a list of items that might go in witches brew. Right now one of the things we are working on is using words such as first,

next, then, and finally to tell the order of something. As children write words that might be hard for them, you can observe whether they are hearing beginning, middle, and ending sounds and are able to write them. Look for opportunities to have your first grader do writing at home and have fun with it!

# 2<sup>ND</sup> GRADE NEWS

The Second Grade had a fantastic October. We had our first fieldtrip to the Farm Field-Day put on by the USU extension service. At the fieldtrip we learned from local farmers, and ranchers all about their work and products. Some of our favorite stations were creating a living necklace out of sprouted wheat, meeting the cows, ducks, goats, horses, chicken, and rabbits, as well as learning about germs and hand-washing. We continued our farm to table themed trip as we traveled to the grocery store. There we learned how the grocers clean and process the meats and produce they receive from the farmers and ranchers. Our classes especially loved the meat packing and dairy sections.

In math we started a unit all about measurement. We enjoyed learning about inches and feet. We created our own rulers along with using a variety of measurement tools including inch rulers, yardsticks, and a measuring tape.

We loved participating in the Halloween parade and our class Halloween parties. We are grateful to all of the parents and guardians that helped make this day a success.

Looking forward, our first Trimester ends November 14<sup>th</sup> with report cards to follow soon after.

Just a reminder, the best thing parents can do to help their children succeed in 2nd grade is to make sure their student reads every day and completes the assigned homework, which is an important review of the concepts taught in the classroom. As always, it is a privilege to teach these terrific children.

# 3RD GRADE NEWS

In science, we've been studying living and non-living things. Encourage your children to use the words, isopod, terrarium, environment, classify, and observation. In November, we'll be studying indigenous peoples of the American continent. We've been working on writing paragraphs in class. Starting in the middle of November, we'll be requiring paragraphs for the writing homework instead of sentences. We'll also start a new book report in November, due December 8th. Watch for that to come home. We have been learning multiplication. Ask your children to sing their skip counting songs to you. Remember to practice typing. You can use the games on Mrs. Child's website to help you. We are loving teaching your children. They are a delightful group!

# 4TH GRADE NEWS

We have had a lot of fun activities this past month! We had the opportunity to go on a field trip to the state Capitol. We were given a great tour where students were able to learn about the materials and structure of the building. They also learned about our legislature and where and why they meet.

We were also able to go to the Daughters of Utah Pioneers Museum. This museum has many wonderful pioneer artifacts. Students were able to go on a scavenger hunt through the different floors to find certain items. Students were amazed at the different artifacts the pioneers made and used.

Our students also enjoyed the activities involved with red ribbon week where they learned the importance of keeping a drug and violence free life.

We are looking forward to having an assembly about the water cycle in November. This is aligned with our science curriculum.

# 5TH GRADE NEWS

We have been working hard in fifth grade. During the month of October, many students mastered long division with double-digit divisors! On the first day of school, we gave every fifth grader a math computation test, which included addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. We gave this same test again last week, and are happy to report that every single fifth grader has improved from the beginning of the year! If your child still struggles with multiplication facts (and it is slowing them down) we are asking that you continue to drill these facts at home for 10 minutes every night with flash cards, multiplication games/apps, etc.

We are looking forward to the month of November. Our goal is for students to become fluent in all operations of decimals (add, subtract, multiply and divide) by Thanksgiving. During Writer's Workshop, we will begin an in depth unit on poetry. Your child will write many poems using numerous poetic forms and styles. We have started to learn about Colonial America. We conclude this unit by having a Colonial Day. This will be on Monday, November 24<sup>th</sup>. All fifth graders are encouraged to school dressed in Colonial come attire. Students will rotate during the school day between stations designed to give them a sample of what life was like in Colonial times -Colonial games, schoolroom, food, arts/crafts, social behavior.

Our first 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Talent Show will be on Tuesday, November 25<sup>th</sup> from 12:45-2:15 in the gym. We require all fifth grade students to perform in ONE of our three talent shows. We are excited for the first third of our students to share their talents!

# 6TH GRADE NEWS

Wow! What a fantastic month October has been for the sixth grade! In science we have been studying space. A few weeks ago we had an evening star party. Many students and their families attended. Some even brought telescopes so we could get a closer look at the planets. We also had iPads loaded with an app that allowed the students to see in real time what constellations were in the sky at the location the iPad was pointed. Sadly, the night was cloudy so we weren't able to see with the telescopes but the iPads were a huge hit. Despite the weather, we still had a blast. A big thanks to all the families who attended!

As November approaches, we are looking forward to another wonderful month. We'd like to make parents of 6<sup>th</sup> grade students aware that on Tuesday, November 11<sup>th</sup>, we will be going on a field trip to the Clarke Planetarium in Salt Lake City. The remaining \$2050 will be used to fund the rest of the programs PTA provides throughout the year. Fifty-one children raised one hundred dollars or more and Olive Garden was awe some to provide a free meal to this large number of students.
