Review of the minutes from March:

Natalie moved to approve the minutes, Jenny seconded, all approved

Ron Clark tour report:

Ashley Child, Tara Tabrizi, Kenzie Clement, Rachel Kennedy, and Paisley Streuper gave a report about their visit to the Ron Clark school in Atlanta. They talked about the idea of having high expectations for your students, learning about the value of visiting your students before the first day of school, creating an environment where students and teachers alike want to be at school. They all felt like it was a very worthwhile trip.

Trustlands Goals

2018-2019 Trustland Goals

Goal #1 Reading

We will improve the percentage of students reading on grade level in grades K-3 by 2%, from End of Year DIBELS 2018 to End of Year DIBELS 2019. Our 4-6 grade students will make progress by increasing the percentage of students at the proficiency level on the ELA SAGE assessment by 1% when comparing Spring 2018 to Spring 2019.

Goal #2 Writing

Students in grades 3-6 will increasing writing proficiency on ELA SAGE assessment by 1% when comparing Spring 2018 to Spring 2019.

Goal #3 Math

Students in grades 5-6 will increasing math proficiency on Math SAGE assessment by 1% when comparing Spring 2018 to Spring 2019.

We had a discussion about our wishes, methods and goals for improvement for each student. One of our concerns was that we wondered what would be the appropriate percentage of improvement to set as our goal. Most grades felt that 1 % improvement was best for Math, Reading, and Writing, and for Reading in K-3, we would aim for 2%. It was suggested that we make all goals a 2% improvement. 6th grade raised some concerns about the extremity of that percentage and wanted to adopt the 1% instead. That led to a rigorous discussion about what percentage of improvement we wanted to work toward. It was noted that there was a drop in SAGE performance scores at the 6th grade mark, so some felt if we are behind in state results, we should increase our expectations.

Ultimately we settled on a compromise:

Mindy moved that we leave all of our Trustland goals as listed here as they are, with the expectation that we will re-examine these goals again in the fall of 2018 and revise accordingly if our 2017-2018 scores show that we are below state average scores.

Juli seconded this motion, there was one dissenting vote (Natalie Hill), and the rest approved.
