Ask The Experts

ever before in the history of the United States has so much been written about the topic of literacy nor has more funding been allocated for remediating students' reading difficulties. How can we maximize students' academic potential so they are equipped to meet this complex and perpetually changing world of work? These are questions that are often discussed in educational circles. Various solutions have been studied, and by far the most effective is this simple strategy—parents reading aloud to their children.

Jim Trelease tells in his book, The Read-Aloud Handbook, of the 4.000 students that took the ACT in 2002, 58 received a perfect score. When it was discovered that a kid from Russell, Kentucky, (a small Appalachian, low income town), had aced the test, the family was besieged with questions, the most common being "What prep course did he take?" As it turns out, unlike some of the private plans that now cost up to \$250 an hour, all his preparation was free. The Williams simply read to Christopher and his younger brother thirty minutes a night, year after year, from infancy through adolescence. Their home was literacy rich, with no room for a TV Guide or electronic games. Tad and Susan Williams offered no home instruction; they "just read to them sowing...the sounds and syllables and endings and blendings of language into the love of books. Each boy easily learned to read, loved it, gobbled it up voraciously. Besides being a family bonding agent, reading aloud... ensured (that) the boys would be ready for whatever came their way in school."

It is never too late to begin reading aloud to your children. Begin today to awaken their imaginations and improve their language skills. As you share stories together, an amazing bond will cement your relationships and enrich your lives.

t this time of year I get a number of phone calls from parents of preschoolers, wondering about speech services. Preschoolers are not always developmentally ready to produce all sounds. Most preschool students are able to make vowel sounds and the consonants "p, b, m, n, t, d f, s, z, k, g". Preschoolers may still distort "sh and ch". The latest developing sounds are "r, I, and th". Many kindergarten children still struggle to produce these sounds, but that is age-appropriate. Continue to model correct sounds (r, l, th) to help your child better understand how to make the sound.

Most preschool students are able to produce 3-4 word sentences, understand and respond to simple directions and ask and answer questions. If you have concerns that your preschool child's speech or language might be delayed, the school district does provide Special Education services for preschool students. You can call the Early Childhood Assessment Center at Greenwood Elementary in American Fork for an assessment. Their phone number 801-610-8857.

One piece of advice I have for parents who would like to prevent some speech problems later on in life is to reduce the amount of time toddlers spend using a "sippy" cup. Modeling good articulation and coaching them to try their sounds again at an early age can also be helpful.
